

We thank Jaden for sharing HIStory with us. We love you! Keeping studing! You're a grand scholar!





CELEBRATING BLACK HISTORY MONTH IS NICE, BUT...

I am not a fan of Black History Month. I make no apology for the fact that I

believe Black history (in America) is American history and should be woven as such. My dream is a history book that combines all of the makings of America into the fantastic story that it is.

I have been black all my life and I have never, ever let that be a problem for me! When I was in third grade (1957), school integration was passed into law and I was bussed to Spotswood Elementary School. I was the only "colored" girl in my class, and I was okay with that! I knew my mission. I was in school to get an education. That was my focus. At that time, I was blissfully ignorant of the racial tensions that surrounded me. There may have been slurs behind my back or jokes on me that I didn't get, but that wasn't my focus. I remained true to who I was and what my mama sent me there to do!

I have never let my blackness be a hindrance to anything I set out to do. Being black just wasn't forefront in my mind as I journeyed through this life. That's not to say that I haven't lost opportunities or suffered setbacks because I was black, but when I put my best foot forward and confidently attack a challenge, I had faith that 'I' (in all of my apparent blackness) would prevail. I like to think that so many of our Black pioneers were of this same mindset. How difficult the journey must have been! Living in a country that they built, by hand and free of charge, yet suffering the degradation brought on by ignorance! I'm overwhelmed and often heartbroken when I read biographies of so many of the unsung heroes of African origin who contributed so much to our American way of life. Where would this country be without them!

As a teenager in the late 1960's, I was in the midst of racial and economic strife in America. I was aware of uprisings of racial tensions and the inequality that many black people suffered. Yet, in my corner of the woods, the struggle of being black wasn't the dinner table discussion. I had not yet settled on a worldview. My life was centered on every day. How to survive this day and make it to tomorrow. Simply put, there was no time to dwell on those things that we could not change. The mission was to put one foot in front of the other and keep it moving. We would celebrate accomplishments and learn from failure.

Today is so different from my days growing up. The rise of the black voice, social media in all of its forms, protests for equal rights, social justice demands, and other forms of activism have opened my eyes to so many realities that I simply was not aware of. Technology has turned on the lights! Real time video, camera recordings and other outlets have opened many eyes to the reality of living black in America. It's disheartening, it's disgusting and it's scary. It's deep rooted and it's pervasive. It's sad. So much of our lack of progress is manmade. Imagine a world where "each one teach one". A world of people dedicated to the progress of all. It's a dream that must become a reality for all of us to survive. I am not scholar, and I don't know how best to navigate what has become the "task" of living black in the USA. The struggle is real, and we must continue to 'make good trouble' and pray that equality is realized.

In the meantime, I'm going to allow the Lord to direct my steps, be prepared, having confidence in my every endeavor and have faith in the knowledge that my best IS good enough!"



During this pandemic time, it has been a challenge for the "church" to continue with the encounter of spreading the gospel to those within the church family as well as abroad. The pandemic took away some sports, restaurants, and gyms. The most alarming, it took away some regular church services; however, there is no pause button for a pandemic. The Great Commission is still at stake. The Word of God must continue to ring out. Outreach must continue. Discipleship must keep happening.

The church has to beat the pandemic by trying new things. We have to develop new or improved ministries, to share messages of hope. In other words, we have to reimage ministry.

What if we saw this time of disruption not as simply a time to tolerate changes to ministry, but as a divine invitation to shift our perspective on ministry.

HISTORY OF TWO UNION CHURCHES

Beulah Baptist Church

Rev. Dr. W David Lee, Pastor

The Beulah Baptist church family began in the summer of 1872 when thirty former slaves who were members of the Bethany Baptist church asked for and received permission to form their own congregation. They purchased one acre of land and constructed a brush arbor on the site of our present building.

In July of 1872, Rev. James S. Minor, who was one of the original thirty members, preached the sermon and was acclaimed leader of the congregation. During his years of service, the brush arbor was replaced by two frame structures; the first a primitive one room church and the second in the early 1900's – a more refined sanctuary. By 1880 the new congregation was doing so well that a Bethany member, Mrs. Standard, gifted Beulah with a silver communion set for Christmas. During Pastor Minor's years, members were ruled with a firm hand with no card playing, dancing, loose talk, or loose dressing tolerated. Sunday worship took place one Sunday a month with Sunday School being held every Sunday. This beloved servant of God passed in 1915 after serving 43 years.

Two churches, St. Luke's in Spotsylvania, and St. Matthew in Caroline, were birthed by Beulah during the 1890's.

Rev. C. A. Lindsey was elected in 1916 to become Beulah's second pastor. A born organizer and first rank teacher and preacher, Pastor Lindsey soon had the church providing two Sunday worship services each month as well as weekly Sunday School classes. Three acres of land were purchased in 1932 and a brick edifice containing a baptismal pool was erected in 1933. Foreign missions were emphasized during the thirty-four years of Rev. Lindsey's service. The name of Mrs. Edmonia Jerome was widely recognized across the county as Beulah's one room school next door to the church and regularly sent boxes of clothing, books, and supplies to Africa. Her husband was a professional photographer of note, and the existing photograph of Rev. Minor which graces the Beulah Church Museum was taken by him. He passed in 1950 after serving 34 years.

The name of another Beulah member was widely heralded during Rev. Lindsey's tenure that of church clerk, John J. Wright. Professor Wright was a noted educator, farmer, and landowner who served as church clerk from 1901 until he died in 1931. In the late forties and early fifties, an additional four acres of land was purchased, the church mortgage burned, and worship services were celebrated on four Sundays each month.

Rev. Parrish Freeman was elected as Beulah's third under shepherd in 1951. Pastor Freeman had served as assistant to Rev. Lindsey beginning in 1946 as Youth Minister, so his family was known and loved by the flock. A religious annex building was planned for and begun during Pastor Freeman's brief fruitful years as our leader. His untimely death in a car accident in 1959 was deeply felt by the congregation.

Rev. Charles Franklin was Beulah's fourth pastor in 1961. Rev. Franklin saw to the completion in 1966 of the religious educational complex begun under Rev. Freeman. Rev. Franklin resigned in 1969.

Rev. Robert Bowles our fifth pastor was called to Beulah in 1970. His ministry emphasized stewardship, foreign missions, and godly worship services. He gave nine years of service to Beulah before resigning.

Rev. Preston Jordan sixth pastor served from 1980 – 1982 a native of Queens, NY he accepted the helm as the sixth pastor. Under his pastorate two choirs were organized.

Rev. Ronald Thomas seventh pastor served from 1985-1988 was a native from Houston, Texas. He too was gifted with a talent for inspired gospel preaching and singing. After several years, Rev. Thomas resigned to become the pastor of a church in his hometown of Houston, TX.

Rev. Ralph Ladmirault eighth pastor served from 1990 – 1993 a native of New York by way of Richmond, VA. Rev Ladmirault led the church in meeting the needs of the church in a very spiritual way. The church continued to move onward and upward spiritually, physically, and financially.

Rev. James E. Preast, Jr. ninth pastor served from 1995 – 2000. During his five years, many souls were brought to Christ. Nine nurses were certified by the Red Cross. A Christian Education Director was named. The church museum was organized. Two ministers were licensed to preach, five deacons were ordained, three deaconesses were consecrated, and five women were named trustees.

Rev. Dr. Nathaniel Young was called in 2002 as the tenth pastor of Beulah. He served faithful until his death in 2012. Rev. Young made sure that the church was heavily involved with the NAACP where he connected the church and the community. He was a pillar in the community for social justice and was supportive of Mattaponi Baptist Association, the Baptist General Convention of VA, and the Spotsylvania Sunday School Union

Beulah elected Rev. Dr. W. David Lee as Beulah's eleventh pastor in 2016 to present date. He is a native of Ansonia CT., by way of New Jersey. Under his leadership and vision, Beulah renovated the sanctuary in an unprecedented record of thirty days including a state of art media addition. Pastor Lee ordained the first female Ministers in its entire history. He has ordained four ministers and licensed two. A Beulah Academy has been birthed that conducts classes twice a year. Beulah has been growing spiritually and by membership. Pastor Lee has brought the church into the technological era to better serve the members of this great church. The Food Pantry excelled and gained recognition from the Fredericksburg Regional Food Bank as being one of the leading partners in the community. He has often been quoted as saying "We may not be the best church, but you won't find any better".

We are so thankful to God for the services these eleven men of God have provided to the Beulah church family.

Branch Fork Baptist Church

Elder Donnell Comfort, Pastor

The history of Branch Fork Baptist Church is rich and colorful. It began with the love and amazing grace of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. It's organizing members were former slaves who met in 1866 with Rev. William Hoe in a bush arbor near Holiday Mills, Spotsylvania County, Virginia. The brush arbor is three miles west of the present location of Branch Fork on Stubbs Bridge Road. Rev. Hoe was a traveling minister who aided the spiritual needs of local communities. Rev. Hoe served as pastor of Branch Fork for seven years.

In 1873, Rev. Patrick H. Graves was called as pastor. Rev. Graves served for forty years. During his pastorate, the congregation erected two buildings, one of which is the present church building. Brother Lucian Comfort was the head carpenter who directed the building of each church building. During the time Branch Fork worshipped in the first church building more than 400 members were baptized, 160 couples were united in matrimony (by 1899), and Rev. Shelton T. Willis was licensed to preach. During these beginning years the deacons of the church were Brother Lewis Alexander, Barnet Willis, Fountain Coleman, Zack Brock, Charles Poindexter, William Lewis, and George Barber. Branch Fork continued to grow, and the members erected a new church building in which it continues to worship today. More than 1600 additional members were baptized (now a historical landmark) before he passed from labor to reward in 1913.

Rev. China Coleman picked up the Branch Fork mantle in 1913 and served for the next twenty years. During his pastorate, the Branch Fork saints added the vestibule, new pews, lamps, and a communion set. Rev. Coleman was called to Sparrows Point, Maryland, and Rev. C. T. Mayo and Rev. R. P. Gainey served the church for short periods of time.

In 1937 Rev. O. S. Robinson of Louisa County was called as pastor and served until his death in February 1955. Under his leadership, Branch Fork added two rooms, enlarged the pulpit, installed electric lights, painted the building, and purchased a new pulpit Bible and new hymnals. In 1948 Brother Joseph Despot donated an acre of land to the church for its first cemetery. Following Rev. Robinson's death, Dr. Robert F. Bowles served as pastor until 1958 and Rev. C. C. Dickerson served for six years until 1964.

In January of 1965, Rev. Herman A. Ellis was called to pastor Branch Fork. Rev. Ellis served for thirty years until his death in 1995. Branch Fork prospered ad grew. The church mortgage was repaid in full, and the mortgage note was burned in May 1978. The Deaconess ministry was organized, five acres of land were purchased to expand the cemetery, and a new well was dug. The church building was bricked and enlarged by the addition of a baptismal pool, basement, and multipurpose room. New pews, central air conditioning, stained glass windows, sidewalks, handicap accessible entrance were installed.

Rev. James E. White was the pastor the Lord sent to Branch Fork in 1995. Branch Fork continued its growth, both spiritually and physically. Intensive weekly Bible studies, Children's Church, community outreach through Food Bank membership. Youth Crusades, and Community Witnessing, addition of third Sunday worship service, and annual summer outdoor church services and picnics are each indicative of Branch Fork's service for the Lord. The time, talents, and treasures of the members were put to use on the organ, computers, newsletter production (the Branch Fork Good News) and publications of the Church constitution and bylaws, cemetery mapping, Battle of the Brains. Rev. White resigned in September 2003.

On November 7, 2004, Elder Donnell Comfort accepted his call from God to pastor Branch Fork. Continuing the church's rich history of God's ministry, he inspires and encourages congregational involvement; preaches and teaches thru not only God's word, but through his actions. The church continues to grow and thrive under his anointed leadership as he continues to aid Branch Fork in reinforcing its structural and spiritual foundation.

Sons and associate ministers of Branch Fork include Rev. Shelton Willis, Dr. Joseph R. Despot, Rev. Fennell F. Terrell, Rev. Emmit R. Crump, Rev. Jessie Woolfolk, Rev. Cary Johnson, Rev. John E. Crump, Rev. James E. White, and Rev. Wilson Comfort.

The Branch Fork Historical Preservation Committee was established to preserve and collect the history and living testimony of this church's service for the Lord. The Branch Fork is a historical landmark, and its history is also recorded in the pamphlet **African American History of Spotsylvania**, **Virginia**, and the book **A Different Story** by Roth Coder Fitzgerald.

Always an active, vital presence in Spotsylvania County, Branch Fork was the site of the first meeting of the Spotsylvania Sunday School Union in 1905. The Branch Fork church motto is "Branching Out in the Ministry". Branch Fork serves as a powerful religious mainstay dedicated to serving the many needs of a growing community.
